Our Vision



SA's 2024 Local Hero, Rachael Zaltron OAM, leads Backpacks 4 SA Kids, which provides essentials to over 86,000 children in crisis, including those affected by family violence and homelessness.

Our society relies heavily on incredible people like these who contribute selflessly, going above and beyond to make our great State and Australia a better place for all. The 2024 Australian of the Year recipients embody the essence of active citizenship and show us that by coming together and acting, we create positive change to build stronger, healthier, more compassionate, and vibrant communities.

Capacity Building

Partnerships

Building capacity within our South Australian communities, offsetting disadvantage and addressing the issues of our time is important to us as we foster social cohesion and build national pride.

We bring together our community and stakeholders, providing platforms for our Award recipients and leaders to share their expertise and messages, instigating awareness and change, leveraging their impact and support for their causes to directly improve the quality of our health, social, cultural and economic wellbeing.

Unleashing Employment Opportunities Breakfast

Community Bridging Services (CBS) Inc. hosted an event highlighting the benefits of employing people with disabilities, attended by 70 business and community leaders. Dr Gill Hicks AM MBE discussed the value of diverse perspectives, while Matthew Nicholls and Chris O'Connor shared personal insights on disability inclusion. Michael Bois addressed inclusive language and small business employment, and David Cooper covered the commercial benefits of social inclusion. The event emphasised how employing people with disabilities enriches decision–making and adds meaning to work, reinforcing the need for organisations to actively embrace inclusivity and showcasing how CBS can assist in navigating this crucial pathway.

Strengthening Melanoma Research

As part of our 2024 Australian of the Year program in South Australia we were thrilled to partner with the South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI) enabling their researchers to share their work and receive feedback from world-renowned melanoma researchers Professor Georgina Long AO and Professor Richard Scolyer AO. The Professors delivered insights into their leadership approach resulting in ground-breaking research and lifesaving treatment protocols. This expertise and passion will continue to inform SAHMRI's vital work in cancer research.

Flinders University hosted the Professors at the new Health and Medical Research Building (HMRB) enabling their medical research teams to meet and hear of their multi-disciplinary and world-leading approach.

Championing Equality in Sport: Insights from Craig Foster AM

Sport SA's breakfast with Craig Foster AM, the 2023 NSW Australian of the Year, offered a compelling dialogue on advocating for refugees and advancing gender equality in sports. Craig's powerful stories, including his role in aiding the Afghanistan women's football team to escape Taliban control, sparked crucial conversations on women's safety and equity both on and off the field. This event highlighted the urgent need to 'level the playing field' and foster safer, more inclusive communities, driving forward essential discussions about women's roles and protections in sports and beyond.

South Australian recipients are:


- Australian of the Year: Tim Jarvis AM, an

- Local Hero: Rachael Zaltron OAM, founder of Backpacks 4 SA Kids, has supported over 86,000 children in crisis. They provide emergency kits, clothing, and essentials to children and young people facing crises such as family violence or homelessness.

Aus Lights on the River

26 January 2024 Elder Park/Tarntanya Wama

Aus Lights on the River Program brought together all parts of our national story our First Nations' ancestral heritage, Australia's connection to our colonial history and our multicultural and refugee stories.

Inspired by creative visions of Belonging to Country and Connecting to Nature, included immersive, visually engaging light, vision, and sound installations supported with complimentary children's activations. Held in Elder Park/Tarntanya Wama, the event drew over 30,000 attendees.

The program included a Welcome to Country by Senior Kaurna Elder Frank Wanganeen and a Flag Ceremony with the Australian Defence Force. The Respecting Country Parade, accompanied by Matsuri Taiko drummers. Creative Director Cindi Drennan's projections highlighted sea life and nature.

The evening concluded with performances by Nancy Bates, the Adelaide Youth Orchestras conducted by Keith Crellin OAM, and a stunning fireworks display over the River Torrens/Karrawirra Parri.

Mourning in the Morning – Smoking Ceremony

26 January 2024 Elder Park/Tarntanya Wama

Led by Ngarrindjeri and Kaurna cultural leader Uncle Moogy Sumner and emceed by Kirstie Parker, thousands of South Australians attended the deeply profound and moving ceremony. Truth-telling underpinned this important event.

The event seamlessly integrated elements from the cancelled Twilight Reflections, enriching its cultural depth. Uplifting performances by First Nations musicians Katie Aspel, Vonda Last, and Rob Edwards enhanced the atmosphere. Elders and youth, including inspiring words and their post-referendum hopes. The 'Respectfully Yours' segment collected nearly 450 supportive cards, reflecting a strong commitment to reconciliation.

We extend our deepest gratitude to all participants, including the Tal-Kin Jeri dancers, speakers, and volunteers. Special thanks to the ADCSA's First Nations Open Circle who generously guided our approach.

26 January 2024

Adelaide Oval to Elder Park/Tarntanya Wama

The Respecting Country Parade brought together over 2,000 multicultural and community participants to celebrate Australia's rich cultural mosaic.

This vibrant event showcased the diversity of 55 South Australian communities through colorful displays of culture, music, and dance.

It began with the South Australian Migrant and Refugee Story and Our Ancestral Story, a cultural procession filled with colour, music, and dance. Following this, South Australians at their Best highlighted large and small community organisations, performers, and charities contributing to the state's cultural tapestry. Japanese drumming group Matsuri Taiko energised the event with performances at the start and end, making the day a resounding celebration of community and culture.

Inspiring Australians Student Summit

15 May 2024 Christies Beach High School

The Australia Day Council of South Australia (ADCSA), in partnership with the South Australian Department for Education, launched the inaugural Inspiring Australians Student Summit at Christies Beach High School.

The event, attended by over 483 students from Christies Beach High School, Seaford Secondary College, Cardijn College, Woodcroft College, and Wirreanda Secondary School, featured discussions with state and national Australians of the Year. Key speakers included Craig Foster AM, Tiahni Adamson, Mark Le Messurier, and Dr. Trudy Lin, covering topics such as human rights, climate change, mental health, and special needs inclusion.

The Summit aims to inspire leadership, amplify student voices, and promote active citizenship, highlighting its role in helping students engage with and learn from some of Australia's most notable changemakers.

Australian of the Year Luncheon 2024

21 June 2024 Adelaide Convention Centre Hall

At the 2024 Australian of the Year Luncheon, 550 attendees learned about the groundbreaking work of this year's award recipients. Professors Georgina Long AO and Richard Scolyer AO shared insights into their pioneering research on melanoma and brain cancer, emphasising that "no tan is a safe tan" and discussing advances in cancer care. MC Sonya Feldhoff moderated a Q&A with Tim Jarvis AM on climate solutions, while Sister Meredith Evans recounted impactful stories from refugee families. Young Australian of the Year Tiahni Adamson highlighted the role of Indigenous knowledge in climate action, and Local Hero Rachael Zaltron OAM spoke on supporting vulnerable children.

The event featured performances from the St Peters College band, Elder Conservatorium Chamber Chorale, and the Balinese Society of South Australia, showcasing South Australia's diverse talent and cultural identity.
